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CALL TO ORDER

Matthew Hunt called the meeting to order at 7:00p.m.

On a motion by Justin McCarthy and seconded by Brad Austin it was voted to approve the Feb. 10, 2022, agenda as presented. (AYE: Unanimous). Motion carried.

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INTERESTED CITIZENS

Brian McCarthy – Frustrated of the way this school committee and the Superintendent has handled the mask mandate. The pool swaps being used are only for emergency use. Masking is a challenge for both students and staff. Students cannot see their teachers' faces or expressions.

School Committee and Superintendent should be making educational choices, not health decisions. Mask optional should be voted on immediately and any mask requirements should no longer be mandated.

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Greg Pennini – Thanked Brian McCarthy for his comments. Could not agree more with this. As of tomorrow, my children will be coming to school without masks, and they will not be wearing masks on the bus either.

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RECOGNITION

1. Student Representative(s) Update: Student representative, Stella Austin gave an update on upcoming school activities and events taking place at all four schools.

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- 2. February 28th Vaccination clinic: Superintendent Clenchy gave an update on the February 28th vaccination clinic. The Littleton Public Schools and Town of Littleton hosted another VaxinateRX Clinic at the Littleton Middle School on Monday, February 28th from 3:00 6:00PM.
 - 1st and 2nd doses of Pfizer and Moderna Vaccines for Pediatrics ages 5-11
 - 12 and older Pfizer and Moderna Boosters
 - There will be another clinic on March 21 at 4pm at the Middle School. Other dates may follow if approved.
 - **3. February 15, 2022, National School Resource Officers' Day:** Superintendent Clenchy thanked Detective Janakos for everything he does for our students and staff.
 - **4. Diane Crory Field Hockey Coach**: She will be retiring as the Varsity Field hockey coach.
 - **5. MSBA Meeting Shaker Lane School bid has been accepted into first phase:** Superintendent Clenchy shared the great news that the Shaker Lane School renovation has been accepted into the Eligibility phase. It can take up to 5-6 years before a new building could be finished. Feasibility Study.
 - **6. The Ooch Experience:** Superintendent Clenchy gave a brief update on the first of seven shows scheduled for Littleton families in collaboration with Park & Rec. Shows will take place at the High school and middle school and it can also be attended virtually.

PRESENTATIONS

1. RSS Ukulele presentation: Music Teacher Mr. Gansenberg shared the addition of ukuleles to the music program and showed a couple of clips from a 4th grade music class. He explained the difference between some of the instruments being used in the classrooms.

OLD BUSINESS

- 1. **Draft LPS Calendar 2022-2023 School Year:** Mrs. Steele requested the School Committee to approve the 2022-2023 LPS calendar as presented. She brought forward a draft version where Diwali was marked as a holiday on Oct. 24, 2022.
 - Jen Gold I would like to include Diwali on the calendar. What would a potential downside be?
 - Justin McCarthy I think we are in favor of adding in this holiday but at some point, we might have to consider only having Federal holidays on the calendar.
 - Brad Austin I appreciate the students advocating for this Holiday. I am in support of this.
 - Kelly Clenchy There are a few things to consider. When demographics change in the community. It is really difficult to celebrate a Holiday especially when you are a student in middle and high school with the workload they have.
 - Matt Hunt In our masterplan we promote equity, so I am happy to support Diwali as a holiday.
 - On a motion by Jen Gold and seconded by Brad Austin it was voted to approve Diwali as a holiday on the 2022-2023 LPS calendar as presented. (AYE: Unanimous). Motion carried.
 - Jen Gold I do not understand why we must have so many half days and why are they on Wednesday?
- Kelly Clenchy MA creates a school calendar by days. It is 180 days in MA. A half day is considered a full school day towards the count of 180 school days.

Justin McCarthy – Could we have half days on Fridays instead when a vacation week is coming? I think families would appreciate that. Brad Austin – I like the idea as a parent but not sure how I feel about it as an educator. Kelly Clenchy – PD Days for our staff makes a huge difference. It provides great tools for our educators' toolboxes. Justin McCarthy – Could we have elementary conferences being two afternoons and two evenings? Brad Austin – Could we just vote on the start date? Justin McCarthy – Would it be worth taking a second look at the calendar. Maybe move some half days to Fridays? Kelly Clenchy – I do not feel comfortable talking about contract language in an open forum. But we can take a second look at the calendar and see if there is any room to move certain days/events around. Elizabeth Steele – I think it will be more challenging but not impossible to conduct a PD Day on a Friday afternoon. Matt Hunt – There are pros and cons to having a PD Day on a Friday afternoon. On a motion by Justin McCarthy and seconded by Brad Austin it was voted to approve the 2022-2023 start date on Sept. 7 for the students and Sept. 6 for the staff. (AYE: Unanimous). Motion carried. 2. Draft School Committee Calendar 2022-2023: Superintendent Clenchy requested the School Committee to approve the 2022-2023 school committee calendar as presented. On a motion by Brad Austin and seconded by Justin McCarthy it was voted to approve the 2022-2023 school committee calendar as presented. (AYE: Unanimous). Motion carried. 3. Update on Mask Flexibility at RSS and LHS: Mask flexibility implementation for SL and LMS scheduled for Friday March 4, 2022: Update on implementation of RSS mask flexibility, Resumption of mask flexibility at LHS. As of Friday March 4th, all four schools will participate in the mask flexibility. **Public Comments** Jessica Sullivan - I feel like the younger students do not understand what is going on. 4. Conditions required for Mask Flexibility: Discussion of pooled testing and prevalence rate requirement Jen Gold – I feel very strongly that we should drop all the conditions/requirements. Brad Austin – A couple of things have changed. The number of cases in the school. I do think we should have pool testing being an option for our students. Matt Hunt – Pool testing was more valuable with the Delta virus. I strongly encourage everyone to participate in pool testing but it is a lot of work for everyone involved. I would be fine if we remove pool testing as a requirement for mask flexibility participation.

Justin McCarthy – I am in favor of eliminating the requirement of pool testing to participate in mask flexibility.

Brad Austin – I just want to ensure that there isn't any judgment if people choose to continue to wear their masks. People need to do what makes them feel comfortable.

Kelly Clenchy – School Committee really wanted to have a parent consent. Is this no longer something you will be requiring?

Jen Gold – We should remove all requirements; all mask mandates and protocols should be dropped beginning immediately.

Matt Hunt – So we are agreeing to remove all conditions, and this means that masks are optional for everyone without any stipulations (pool testing, parent permissions, etc.).

On a motion by Jen Gold and seconded by Justin McCarthy it was voted to approve the mask flexibility without any requirements to participate. (AYE: Unanimous). Motion carried.

Lyn Snow – Addressed the issues with the younger students and mask wearing. All the guidance that has been provided by DESE has been for grade K-12. But our preschool staff is very aware of the many ways they must navigate this time of change and the many challenges it can present for both students and staff.

5. CDC lifting of requirement to wear masks on school buses and vans: School Committee and Superintendent discussed the new CDC guidelines as well as determined the direction of moving forward. The CDC announced effective February 25, 2022, it is no longer requiring that masks be worn on school buses or vans for K-12 students and children in childcare programs. Schools and districts may decide whether to lift or maintain local mask requirements on buses or vans. As always, any individual who wishes to continue to mask should be supported in that choice.

On a motion by Justin McCarthy and seconded by Jen Gold it was voted to approve the lifting of the mask wearing mandate on the school buses and vans as of March 3, 2022 as presented. (AYE: Unanimous). Motion carried.

> Steve Mark reminded everyone that buses and vans are still being cleaned and disinfected and it will continue as well as the school buildings.


