Grade 6


- Students participated in a 90-minute presentation about depression and suicide

- SOS refresher and screening for depression and suicide
- Refresher will happen in May.







- Helps you prioritize problems, fears, and concerns.
- Provides an opportunity for positive self-talk and identifying negative thoughts and behaviors.
