Brad Austin – Thank you for the presentation. It was wonderful to hear that it was a great year for Social and Emotional learning. Especially this year. The 5<sup>th</sup> grade curriculum about the Revolutionary War is so heavy. How do you get through that?

Elizabeth Steele – It is a heavy lift. We introduce the curriculum, and the students continue to learn as they move along in the higher grades.

Kelly Clenchy – Thanked the Curriculum Coordinators and all their presentations. He is very proud of the curriculum coordinators. They are always looking for new ways to innovate our students.

**2. State/Local/Public Health Metrics:** Mike Fontanella provided a presentation on the State/Local/Public Health Metrics. The data presented was through May 1st, 2021.

Test positivity rate is now at 2.88% in Littleton. Littleton's rate is 22.0 per 100K. Littleton has 30 new cases and Littleton is still in the red. Within the four schools all pooled tests have been negative.

Mr. Fontanella reminded everyone, parents, and students, to do the right thing. Keep your mask on, social distance and use all the layers of mitigations to protect yourself, your family, and the community.

Lyn Snow gave a quick update on pool testing. This week we had all negative pools testing but we did have a positive case with a participant in pool testing. The specimen in the pool testing gets diluted, so it can happen that you participate in pool testing one day and it does not show a positive case but then you get tested the day after and find out, you are positive. DESE is looking ahead to see if Districts are interested in continuing with pool testing next school year.

Mike Fontanella – Since we have not had one positive pool, would it be beneficial to continue with pool testing?

Lyn Snow - DESE are starting to look at the financial burden with pool testing for districts and the benefits for continuing. I assume we will hear more in June or July on this topic.

Justin McCarthy – Thinking of the picture of the library books in the return bag? Are we still doing that procedure?

Lyn Snow – There has been a lot of studies of surface areas and our methods have changed since last year. But yes, we are still quarantining books for now.

**3. Bus Registration 2021-2022 -** Business Manager Steve Mark discussed the process for 2021-2022 Bus Registration. This year we are asking each family that you register your child for the bus whether you need to pay the fee or not. Mr. Mark went through the registration page online.

Justin McCarthy – With this new registration system, will it automatically create the bus route? Steve Mark – No, we create the bus route manually. But this will give us a much better picture of how many students will actually be on the bus.

#### COVID STIPENDS TO STAFF

1. Covid Stipends: Chair Mike Fontanella discussed the Covid stipends provided to staff.

#### Rising to the Challenge

The 2020-2021 school year was one of unprecedented challenges and requirements for everyone but not least of all for public school employees. The Littleton School Committee and Administration recognize that our staff have had to meet their regular job responsibilities each school day all while being asked to also support the significant requirements of COVID-19 mitigation strategies and procedures that have helped us maximize our in-person instruction while also keeping our students and staff safe and healthy as well as supporting remote learners.

Many staff worked extra hours in the summer to come up with plans for hybrid and remote teaching while others worked tirelessly to prepare buildings and classrooms to meet social distancing requirements and to have the required supplies and materials for hand-sanitizing, PPE and cleaning and disinfecting. Staff participated in professional development to ramp up on COVID-19 health and safety protocols regarding social distancing, use of PPE, cleaning and disinfecting, screening for COVID symptoms and other procedures. They participated in additional PD specific to delivering curriculum to in-person and remote learners which required the use of cameras and other technology. Once classes started, all our staff were required to meet their normal job requirements and responsibilities but to ALSO adhere to requirements regarding safety and health protocols AND support our students and help them navigate those same safety and health protocols. Every staff member was asked to do their regular job and then do their COVID job on top of that. And our students benefited greatly from those efforts. Littleton had in-person instruction on the first day of school in all our buildings while many other Districts opened fully remote. Our staff's efforts on the health and safety protocols allowed us to avoid in-school COVID outbreaks and let us maximize the number of in-person learning days. Our remote instruction program was far more robust than most Districts with an emphasis on in-class, synchronous instruction and learning versus independent, asynchronous work by remote students. When DESE mandated a full return to in-person instruction, the efforts by our staff allowed us to reopen WELL BEFORE mandated deadlines. We did not give staff more hours or more days to do all of this, we just asked them to fit MORE work and effort into the SAME hours each day. AND THEY DID IT. DAY AFTER DAY, WEEK AFTER WEEK.

The School Committee and Administration have strived to regularly communicate our appreciation and admiration for all this work and effort but now the Chair and the Superintendent feel it is time to put some money where our mouth is.

The Chair and Superintendent are asking the School Committee to authorize a one-time \$1000 stipend to be paid to all non-LEA staff for the additional work and responsibilities they were asked to provide during this school year. This would cover custodians, cafeteria workers, teaching assistants, administrative support staff, administrators, OTs, PTs, BCBAs, technology staff, etc.

Please note that LEA members (teachers and nurses) are not part of this proposal ONLY because we are in active salary negotiations with the LEA. Both sides have proposals on the table, and we are working through them. After an agreement is reached, additional compensation along these lines is something the School Committee can certainly consider.

The number of staff this would cover is approximately 111. For reference, we have approximately 144 LEA members for a total staff count of approximately 255. The total cost of this stipend would be \$111,000. This would be a one-time, non-pensionable payment that would either be included in a regular payroll check or be a separate payroll run. The Administration would need 2-4 weeks to prepare for these stipends to be paid.

The cost of this stipend program would be covered with School Choice funds.

With a projected balance of approx. \$2.0M, we are confident this fund can support the stipends and still retain a healthy balance. In addition, there are additional Federal COVID relief funds expected this summer to help meet ongoing budget challenges that we might otherwise have needed to use School Choice funds for. While it could be argued the amount of the stipend is not commensurate with the amount of extra work and effort our staff has provided this year, we are hopeful that this will be regarded as a meaningful and

sincere gesture of recognition for everything our staff has done for our students and our District in a year of historical and unprecedented challenges. Regardless of how bad things were, and they were bad, they would have been much, much worse if not for the work and commitment of our staff.

Brad Austin – Yes, I absolutely support this. I think this is appropriate.

Matthew Hunt – The gesture in itself is worth it. It shows how much we appreciated everything everyone has gone through.

Justin McCarthy – It is certainly something I can support.

Timalyn Rassias – This is definitely something I can support. I really appreciate what everyone has done.

Kelly Clenchy – I am in full support of this. Our staff went above and beyond. They never stopped!

On a motion by Matthew Hunt, and seconded by Timalyn Rassias, it was voted to approve the Covid Stipend of \$1,000 as presented. (AYE: Unanimous). Motion carried. Roll Call Vote: Matthew Hunt, AYE; Brad Austin, AYE; Justin McCarthy, AYE; Timalyn Rassias, AYE; and Mike Fontanella, AYE.

#### **OLD BUSINESS**

- 1. **Update on the High School Sewer Discharge Site:** Chair Mike Fontanella gave an update on the Sewer Discharge site. We had a joint meeting with the Water department. How do we want to replace the playing surface? It is a 2.5-million project. 1.5 million would be covered by the State Grant. Total cost of a synthetic field would be about 1 million. Out of the 1 million, it would be about 350,000 for a grass field and School Committee would have to cover the remaining \$750,000 to get a synthetic field.
  - Matthew  $\operatorname{Hunt} \operatorname{I}$  do not think we should spend that kind of money on the synthetic field. We could use that money on a lot of other things.
  - Mike Fontanella The Water department did say that they could put down sod, which is a 70,000-dollar difference instead of regular seed.
  - Brad Austin I cannot support spending that kind of money. If we put down a good sod field, our student athletes will have another sod field. But who will be paying for the watering for the sod? Mike Fontanella The Water department said that if they could start this project this fall 2021, they would pay for the water to keep the sod alive.
  - Justin McCarthy I am not willing to take that kind of money out of our budget. I am in support of a sod field.
  - Timalyn Rassias I think we should go with a sod field.
  - Mike Fontanella I am also supporting a sod field.
  - For time frame, we asked the Water Department to start this project in March 2022 so we could use the field for the Fall 2021 season. But they said that they need to spend the 1.5-million-dollar grant before June 30, 2022 or they will lose the money.
  - Justin McCarthy Would it be possible to start the project in late October 2021 so we could use the field for most of the fall 2021 season? It seems like they should be able to start a little later and still have enough time to spend the grant money before June 30, 2022.
  - Mike Fontanella We should go back to the Water department and tell them that we have decided on a sod field and ask them if it would be possible to start the project mid to late October 2021.

2. The School Committee members discussed the Superintendent's contract updates. Using our two new texts, <u>Stamped: Racism, Antiracism and You</u>, and <u>Black History</u> <u>365</u>, and other sources, students are collaboratively creating an Antiracist Timeline to post around the room to serve as an inspiration for all of us to become Antiracists as we work toward a truly Antiracist society.

### Global Studies

The students in Global Studies are following world events through the lens of the countries they have "adopted" for the year; rich discussions are taking place regarding human rights issues in Russia, China, and countries in the Middle East. Generous grants from the LEF allowed us to access digital materials from Brown University on these countries and issues.

### • World History

Formerly World History II Freshmen teachers have now combined both courses into one in order to have civics taught at the 8th grade level. Students at the Honors level are beginning their research paper on chosen topics from the modern era and CP level are soon beginning their projects regarding the same time frame

### Instruction

- Science Highlights:
  - Or. Hogan used a telepresence robot while he was remote
  - As often as possible, Science came up with strategies for all students to have meaningful hands-on lab experiences.

### • Math Highlights:

More projects are being incorporated into math classes (some examples: data regression project, linear programming project, mario kart project for graphing quadratic functions, birthday polynomial project, map project, cantastic challenge project to find the cost to manufacture a can of soup with 3D formulas, triangle instagram project, quadrilateral family album project, Soh Cah Toa Joe project using trigonometry)





# Mask Wearing

Students no longer need to wear masks when outdoors, even if distance cannot be maintained. The guidance update applies to recess, physical education, youth sports, and outdoor learning environments. Adults must continue to wear masks outdoors if distancing cannot be maintained. At this time, adults and students must continue to wear masks indoors.







# Materials Sharing

Given the low likelihood of surface transmission of COVID-19, schools no longer have to avoid sharing objects. This includes classroom materials, items for physical education, or art supplies. Shared objects no longer have to be cleaned or disinfected between use.



# Surface and Space Cleaning

Based on CDC guidance and updated information on the low likelihood of surface transmission, schools now only need to clean high touch surfaces (door handles, bus seats, drinking fountains) and shared objects within the school and on school transport vehicles once a day, excluding certain circumstances. Littleton Public Schools will continue our protocol of a weekly deep cleaning of each school building.





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
