131		and less reported depression.
132		Littleton start times are a lot earlier than the national average. Most middle schools start at 8:04AM –
134		Littleton starts at 7:20AM and most high schools starts at 7:59AM. LHS start at 7:25AM.
135		More surrounding districts have changed to a later start time such as Acton-Boxborough, Concord-Carlisle
136		among other.
137		The School Committee asked if they could be provided these schools start time to compare.
138		Every school committee member agrees that taking another look at the start time would be beneficial.
139		They did caution this topic has many different issues to be considered and no changes would be able to
140		take place during the 2019-2020 school year. This topic needs much more discussion and opportunity for
141		the community to give their input.
142		Mr. Fontanella suggested this topic be on the agenda at the next meeting and the Superintendent and
143		himself will brainstorm some ideas to bring forward to the committee to further discuss.



- Alternative Structured Learning Day Programs
 - Approved by DESE
 - LPS Snow Day Cancellation Pilot
- Such programs are designed to:
 - Reduce the number of additional school days beyond the 180 required days
 - Minimize student learning disrupted by weather related emergencies by providing alternative learning activities that may be completed at home
 - Meet the standard for structured learning time



What was the guidance from DESE?

- Involve substantial assignments and/or projects rather than resembling homework assignments
- Be accessible to all students
- Consider how to accommodate students without internet or devices at home and households with multiple children who share a single device (if there exists a digital learning component)
- Be able to serve all students, including students who receive special education services






- Surveys went out to 4 groups of stakeholders:




The assignment/project was age and level appropriate for me/my child.






I/my child was supported during the pilot.

Student Responses – Common Themes



- Get out for summer sooner
- Liked being able to do the work at home rather than in hot classrooms in June
- Enough time to complete the work





- Seniors should not have to participate
- Lost the socialization part of school

Future Considerations:

- Quality of assignment
- VHS and AP classes
- If many snow days, fear of amount of work



Parent/Guardian Responses – Common Themes



- Plan for the end of the school year
- Not adding days to June
- Provided insight as to what students were learning
- Appropriate assignments with choices





- Snow days are for fun
- 1 snow day was not enough to provide valid feedback

Future Considerations:

- Receive assignments/packets sooner
- More guidance with regards to on-line resources
- Start program after a couple of snow days



Teacher/Staff Responses – Common Themes



- Avoided hot classrooms in June
- Provided positive learning activities
- Felt students bought into the pilot and were not negatively impacted
- Choice in assignments






- Frustration with current model
- Can a packet or assignment replace time with teacher and peers
- Concern of time with teacher

Future Considerations:

- Clear instructions on what to pass in and when
- Let students choose assignment order





- Earlier communication
- Digital resources website with all materials
- Clear guidelines for the program as a whole



Recommendation: Complete a pilot during the 2019-2020 school year
