35 <u>NEW BUSINESS</u>

- DESE 2021 2022 Preliminary Opening Requirements: Superintendent Clenchy presented the updated
 DESE Preliminary opening requirements for the 2021-2022 School Year.
- 38 1. Health and safety requirements issued by DESE will be lifted
- 39 With the State of Emergency ending June 15, 2021, and as COVID-19 cases,
- 40 hospitalizations, and deaths continue to fall as vaccination rates increase, for the fall, all districts and
- schools will be required to be in-person, full-time, five days a week and all DESE health and safety
 requirements will be lifted. This includes all physical distancing requirements.
- 43 DESE encourages schools to maintain ventilation upgrades from this past year as feasible,
- 44 continue hand hygiene practices, and extend policies that encourage students and staff to
- 45 continue to stay home when sick.
- All current DESE guidance will be archived on the DESE website. Districts and schools may
 continue to refer to this guidance as helpful.
- 48 We will collaborate with the Department of Public Health (DPH) to issue any additional health and safety 49 recommendations (e.g. masks for elementary school students) over the summer,
- 50 and will provide any updates to districts and schools as we receive them.
- 51 **2.** Districts will no longer be able to offer remote learning as a standard learning model
- As noted above, districts and schools will be required to be in-person, full-time, five days a
 week this fall. Pathways that existed prior to the pandemic for offering virtual learning to
 individual students in limited cases will remain available to districts and schools. These

- Test positivity rate is now at 0.72% in Littleton. Littleton's rate is 2.9 per 100K. Littleton had 4 new cases and Littleton is in grey now. Within the four schools all pools from the pooled testing have been negative.

- 77 **3.** Littleton Youth Lacrosse Storage Shed: Business Manager Steve Mark and Youth Lacrosse
- 78 representative JR Teto discussed the Youth Lacrosse building a storage shed on school property near
- Alumni Field. An overview of the project as well as features and location were included in the packet.
- 80 **OVERVIEW**

81 **1. Project Background and Description**

- 82 Proposal Background
- 83 Littleton Youth Lacrosse is proposing the building of a storage shed for the purpose of storing all
- 84 equipment that is needed to support our program. Currently we rent a space in town (private storage) and

- 85 it's very inconvenient to retrieve our equipment, but it's also very costly for our program. This takes away
- 86 from monies we can use to provide the kids with the best possible equipment and training, which is a
- 87 fiscally more prudent way of managing our program.

88 2. Project Scope

89 The scope of the project is straightforward. We are looking to erect a storage shed that will keep our 90 equipment close to Alumni field as that is where 90% of our practices and home games take place. It's a 91 spot that is equidistant between the Middle School and Russell St where some practices (and min) games 92 are played too. This will enable our coaches to retrieve supplies and equipment needed to run practices 93 and games on all 3 fields. Furthermore, it's not on the alumni field (similar to softball/baseball). It is on 94 the grass area adjacent to the field next to the parking lot (see image below). Storage will be used for items 95 including but not limited to: Balls, Sticks, Goalie equipment, medical supplies like ice packs and 96 bandages, extra netting, Coaches bags, creases, etc. The only item that cannot fit into a standard shed are 97 the physical goals. They will continue to be kept in the storage container due to the sheer sizes of the nets. 98

99 **3. High-Level Requirements**

- We will hire a company who will deliver and erect the shed on site. This will not require a permanent slab
 and will be placed on non-permanent blocks. We feel in the event it ever needs to be moved by the school,
 we should have the ability to do so.
- Brad Austin Why are you presenting to School Committee? Do you need approval from us?
- JR Teto Because it is on school property, we need to seek approval.
- 107 Justin McCarthy Is the existing container still there? Who needs to move it?
- 108 JR Teto As of right now, we are storing the lacrosse nets inside of it. So, it does still serve a purpose.
- Kelly Clenchy I do think we need to look into the storage container and find out if it is still usable. Any storage containers that we have on school grounds we should keep up.

Will you be able to find ways to continue to use all this technology going forward, especially the doc cameras? 239 240 Cheryl Temple – Everyone has said that they will continue to use the technology we have implemented in the classrooms this year. 241 242 Jen Gold – I will echo what Brad said about the historical virtual field trips. It is so important that the 243 students learn about our local history. 244 245 Justin McCarthy - Thank you for everything you did. I am sure we have learned a lot and can use some of 246 these new ideas going forward. 247 248 List of Colleges 2021 HS Graduates attending: Superintendent Clenchy presented a summary of the 249 5. various universities and colleges that our 2021 HS Graduates will be attending. The summary list was 250 251 included in the packet. 252 253 School Start Times: The School Committee had a brief discussion on school start times and determined 6. 254 whether this is something that they would like to pursue further. Jen Gold – This is a very interesting topic to discuss. Could we put together some sort of baseline research. 255 Matthew Hunt - Some research was done by prior school committee members before I got onboard. We could 256 257 reach out to other districts, who have changed their school start time. This might be something we can discuss at our School Committee retreat in August. 258 Kelly Clenchy – I would recommend bringing in a consultant to help us with this project. If you want to 259 260 change structures, it will be costly. But if you want to change the time structure by 20-30 min it might be able to be done for a lower cost. But we need to seek input from all stakeholders, such as students, parents, faculty 261 etc. There is a lot of work and a lot of strategies involved in a project as such. 262 263 Matthew Hunt – There are so many variables to think of that it might be a good idea to bring in a consultant to 264 help with this. I think it is worth it to investigate this. 265 I would prefer if we had at least two school committee members who could reach out to other districts that 266 have changed their start time and get some input and data to work with. 267 268 Kelly Clenchy – Speaking with a consultant could be costly. I think we need to start with a sub-group and get 269 input from our stakeholders. That is very important. I am not saving it cannot be done but we need to be 270 mindful of that as well. 271 272 273 Timalyn Rassias – We have gotten so much input from the community, that I feel we owe it to the public to look into this. I believe a consultant is a great idea. Even if we end up not changing any start times at least we 274 have done our due diligence. 275 276 Brad Austin – I believe we learned from this past year that we can take on tough projects and do the research 277 needed and take a tough vote when needed for the following school year. I believe it is the time to have this 278 279 discussion! I am ok with being on the subcommittee for this project. 280 281 Justin McCarthy – I believe there is consensus amongst the school committee members that we need to look 282 into this. I am not sure if you want to create a sub-committee that could work on this over the summer, so we will be ready to present this in the fall. 283 I am ok with being on the subcommittee for this project. 284

Over the past year, we have endured significant struggles; we have endeavored to meet these head on and provide the best possible teaching and learning options for our students and educators. We have also had to address some harsh realities about ongoing inequities in our schools, in our communities, in our country– and how these continue to define or narrow the paths for achievement and success for many of our young people. What We Learned

- On the whole, respondents liked longer blocks
 - Allows for deeper dives into curriculum
 - But, current blocks are too long
- Large percentage of students indicated that having fewer classes helped
 - Feel less rushed; more manageable; less stressed; more time to absorb material
- Concern about lack of daily exposure to material
 - Increased difficulty to monitor student work completion as efficiently
- Students are looking for more opportunities to connect with teachers
 - Looking to the return of daily advisory


+ Pros to Flex Block Schedule

+ Anticipated Challenges and Solutions

- Different length classes may cause challenge in planning
 - Try to schedule classes with multiple sections in same length class
- Not having every mod meet may present challenges in guaranteeing daily teacher prep period
 - Intentional scheduling of teacher prep (ex. Have both A and B off
 <u>or</u> Neither A nor B off)
 - Shared teacher duty responsibilities (similar to this year)
- Don't see classes every day; students need daily practice or more attention
 - Student can be scheduled into extra help sessions during flex
- Individual classes may lose up to 10 hours of seat time
 - Students who need extra support can recoup/offset time during flex

SCHOOL COMMITTEE OPERATIONAL GOALS

The school committee is responsible to the people for whose benefit the school system has been established. The committee's current decisions will influence the course of education in our schools for years to come. The committee and each of its members must look to the future and to the needs of all people more than the average citizen finds necessary. This requires a comprehensive perspective and long-range planning in addition to attention to immediate problems.

The school committee's primary responsibility is to establish those purposes, programs, and procedures that will best produce the educational achievement needed by our students. The committee is charged with accomplishing this while also being responsible for wise management of resources available to the school system. The committee must fulfill these responsibilities by functioning primarily as a legislative body to formulate and adopt policy, by selecting an executive officer to implement policy, and by evaluating the results. It must carry out its functions openly, while seeking the comments of public, students, and staff in its decision-making processes.

In accordance with these principles, the technique will involve:

- 1. Periodically setting performance objectives for the school committee itself and evaluating their accomplishment.
- 2. Setting objectives for the performance for each position and function in the system.
- 3. Allowing the people responsible for carrying out the objectives to have a role in setting them.
- 4. Establishing practical and simple goals.
- 5. Conducting a concrete and periodic review of performance against these goals.

SCHOOL COMMITTEE LEGAL STATUS

The school committee is the governing board of the town's public school system. Although it functions as a duly elected committee of town government, the school committee has--unlike other town boards--autonomous and absolute authority within limitations established by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts to carry out the educational policies of the state and guide the educational process.

SCHOOL COMMITTEE POWERS AND DUTIES

The school committee has all the powers conferred upon it by state law and must perform those duties mandated by the state. These include the responsibility and right to determine policies and practices and to employ a staff to implement its directions for the proper education of the children of the community.

The committee takes a broad view of its functions. These are seen as:

1. <u>Legislative or policymaking</u>. The committee is responsible for the development of policy as guides for administrative action and for employing a superintendent who will implement its policies.

2. <u>Appraisal.</u> The committee is responsible for evaluating the effectiveness of its policies and their implementation.

3. <u>Provision of financial resources.</u> The committee is responsible for adoption of a budget that will enable the school system to carry out the committee's policies.

4. <u>Public relations.</u> The committee is responsible for providing adequate and direct means for keeping the local citizenry informed about the schools and for keeping itself and the school staff informed about the needs and wishes of the public.

5. <u>Educational planning and evaluation</u>. The committee is responsible for establishing educational objectives that will guide the committee and the staff in establishing goals and working together for the continuing improvement of the educational program.
