CALL TO ORDER

Mike Fontanella called the meeting to order at 7:00p.m.

On a motion by Matthew Hunt, and seconded by Justin McCarthy, it was voted to approve the July 23, 2020 consent agenda as presented. (AYE: Unanimous). Motion carried. Roll Call Vote: Matthew Hunt, AYE; Timalyn Rassias, AYE; Brad Austin, AYE; Justin McCarthy, AYE; and Mike Fontanella, AYE.

INTERESTED CITIZENS

Aruna Thummepalli – Wondering which option the Littleton Public School will choose. Mike Fontanella is hoping the decision should be made at the next school committee meeting.

Rebecca Lewis – Has there been any discussion if we choose a remote learning plan, that the Middle and High school students could have a later start time in the morning? Mike Fontanella replied this is one of the options being discussed if we go with all remote learning.

Mike Colson – If we choose the hybrid-learning plan. Are collected voices of teachers going to be heard through this negotiation? - Mike Fontanella ensured that teachers' voices are being heard but the final decision will be made by the School Committee board.

Kathleen Croal – She knows there is an option to keep your child home regardless of the learning plan in place. What happens if you feel during the school year that you would like your child to go back into the classroom. Mike Fontanella ensured that this is being looked at and an option to opt back in is possible. In general, there is support not to make this a year long remote learning at home. If you choose to have an inperson student but certainly want to change to remote learning, you can do that as well.

Carmen Rkitain – Start date. Has that been decided yet? Mike Fontanella – it is on tonight's agenda.

Achol Macam – Are you deciding on one model for the full school year? Mike Fontanella – we could possibly be using any of all three models throughout the school year. Right now we are working on which model we will start the school year with. Brad Austin – Another parent survey to voice their opinion on all models are being emailed out before next the school committee meeting.

 Andrea Michaud – What happens if the teachers union and school committee cannot reach an agreement? Will parents who are teachers in other districts be considered "essential workers" so their child/children could be in school every day regardless of the plan in place? Mike Fontanella – there are steps that can be taken if needed. But he certainly hopes it won't come to that.

We might be able to look at individual circumstances but if we choose a hybrid or a remote learning plan it is to have as few students in the classroom as possible

Elleen Wedegartner – DESE came out with options for remote learning plans /courses from Greenfield and other offers. Is this something the district is looking into? Mike Fontanella – this was just released yesterday and the district hasn't had a chance to look into this. But if opportunities present themselves to serve our students better, we will be looking at every opportunity.

Matthew Ridge – We do have families where both parents need to work. All three plans are making it impossible for working families. Mike Fontanella – the question/concern is one for the state level. We are being asked by the State to start school with one of the three models we have presented and they will be voted on.

Kevin Davis – If we choose a hybrid or remote learning plan. Will Littleton teachers teach students? Mike Fontanella – yes it will be Littleton educators teaching the students.

Heather Stimpson – Park & Rec are looking to provide childcare for Littleton families? How can they provide childcare if schools are not allowed to provide in-person learning? Mike Fontanella – This would be a question for Park & Rec.

Jaime Miller – How many mask breaks for SL & RSS students? Will this fall also only be 3-hour teaching as it was in the spring? Optimizing outside space for instruction. Kelly Clenchy – we are looking at every opportunity to use outside space for instruction.

John Harrington – High School will be a typical school year with about 6-hour instruction time. Kelly Clenchy – All four schools will follow a regular school day of instruction following the MA Curriculum Framework Standards.

Michael Bock – Why haven't we called the Point to see if we can use their vacant space? Mike Fontanella – At the moment we have not looked at those options. The idea of spreading our students outside of school buildings is not feasible. We do not have the bandwidth or money to use outside space.

- Kristen Kehrer Does remote learning look different than any other plans? Mike Fontanella Remote learning will look very much like an in-person or hybrid learning plan. The days will look and feel the same regardless of location of the students.
- 88 Erin Ridge Her son is starting in Kindergarten. When will Kindergarten screenings take place? Michelle 89 Kane – Once we determine which plan we will be using; screening will take place. That goes for class 90 assignments as well.
- Carmen Rkitain Are you trying to have a similar school day whether you choose remote or hybrid plan.
 Mike Fontanella Yes, the plan is to have a regular school day.
 - Aline Davis Will classes be recorded for later viewing? John Harrington Some teachers are interested in recording their classes. We will need to negotiate with teachers for this option.

- **2. Welcome our new Pupil Services Director, Lyn Snow.**Superintendent Kelly Clenchy introduced Lyn Snow, Director of Pupil Personnel Services.

NEW BUSINESS:

1. Updated 2020-2021 Calendar: Superintendent Kelly Clenchy requested approval on the updated 2020-2021 School Calendar with a new start date for students of Sept. 16, 2020.

On a motion by Matthew Hunt, and seconded by Brad Austin, it was voted to approve the updated 2020-2021 School Calendar as presented. (AYE: Unanimous). Motion carried. Roll Call Vote: Matthew Hunt, AYE; Timalyn Rassias, AYE; Brad Austin, AYE; Justin McCarthy, AYE; and Mike Fontanella, AYE.

PRESENTATION:

1. HVAC Update: Chair, Mike Fontanella gave an update on the HVAC Systems within the school buildings. Steve Mark ensured that we have used the same maintenance company for years.

DESE Guidance on HVAC Systems:

- Clean ventilation system
- Run HVAC systems for one week prior to school opening
- All rooftop and classroom HVAC units have been inspected, cleaned and filters replaced by our contractor this summer
 - All rooftop and classroom HVAC units are in full working condition
 - All rooftop and classroom HVAC units will be inspected by our vendor monthly during the 2020 2021 school year (as opposed to quarterly)
 - Monthly inspections will ensure all units and parts are clean and in full working condition and filters are replaced as needed
 - HVAC systems will be run for one week prior to schools opening
- Filters for all rooftop HVAC units will be MERV 11 or MERV 13 when school opens
 - (Russell Street has been MERV 13 since re-build, other schools were using MERV 8)
- Rooftop HVAC units will be running each day at 100% capacity (standard practice) which will refresh air in the buildings

- Rooftop HVAC units will continue to run at 100% at night (after all students and staff have departed) for an additional 2 hours, guaranteeing fresh air in the building for the start of the next day
 - Consider upgrading filters
 - Maintain ventilation for longer hours

- Filters for all classroom HVAC units will be MERV 11 when school opens, up from MERV 8
- Classroom HVAC units will run at a minimum setting of 60% fresh air (up from standard 30% setting)
- Classroom HVAC units will run at night (after all students and staff have departed) for an additional 2 hours
- Weather conditions permitting, all classroom (and building) windows will be open throughout the school day to aid in circulating fresh air into the buildings

- Russell Street is the only school with central AC. The three other schools, including Shaker Lane, have some AC units in parts of the building to help address conditions on hot days
- Staff will move students, as possible and necessary, to these parts of the buildings should conditions warrant it
- With the implementation of Remote Learning, the Superintendent can declare a full school Remote Learning day if conditions warrant it

- All schools, including Shaker Lane, have fully functioning rooftop and classroom HVAC units that are running at peak efficiency allowing maximum air movement through the buildings and classrooms
- All four schools are complying with and meet DESE recommendations regarding air quality

- Matthew Ridge Hospitals are running with MERV 18 or MERV 20. Our school system will only get part of the air cleaned. Not being able to keep the virus away.
- Mike Fontanella Filters are not designed to kill the virus. They are designed to provide fresh and clean air to the people inside the school buildings.

Kathleen Wells – Are all the HVAC systems MERV 13 filters in compliance? Steve Mark – Currently we have MERV 8 filters but will install MERV 11 before school starts and have MERV 13 on order and they are in compliance with what is required at official buildings.

2. Initial Protocols for responding to COVID-19 scenarios:

Superintendent Kelly Clenchy presented the Initial Protocols for responding to COVID-19 scenarios. An overview of the different events/scenarios is included in the packet.

Brad Austin – How will we be conducting the contact tracing if a student gets infected? Kelly Clenchy – it will be done with the Board of Health department's guidance and protocol put in place.

3. DESE Initial Fall Re-Opening Guidance – Elizabeth Steele, Director of Curriculum discussed DESE's (Department of Elementary and Secondary Education Department) Initial Fall Re-Opening Guidance information which was released to the public on June 25, 2020. DESE is requiring each district and school to plan for remote learning and a hybrid school model, a combination of in-person and remote learning, should local conditions change this fall or winter.

All plans will have the following expectations:

- Daily connecting with all students, remote and virtual models connecting via video conferencing
- Collaborate with students and families
- Use of high-quality curricular materials
- Instruct the full grade/course level standards
- Follow a regular daily schedule that meets time on learning requirements
- 5-day rotation

Hybrid Learning Plans

- Hybrid Learning Plans will have the following expectations:
- Replicate the connections made during an in-person school day
- Plan for providing timely feedback to students
- Plan for assessing student work
- Administrative access to all Google Classrooms
- Plan for tracking attendance
- Parent/Teacher conferences
- Participation is required pending student/family abilities (Not optional)

Russell Street School Principal, Cheryl Temple gave a brief overview for their hybrid plan for the Elementary School:

The **Russell Street School Hybrid Model** is constructed with several goals in mind. Our primary focus is to (1) create small cohorts of students, and (2) reduce the total number of exposures for each student and teacher.

The **Russell Street School Hybrid Model** is a mix of In-Person Learning and Remote Learning. Each grade will have two groups, A and B.

Each teacher in the Monday-Tuesday Model will pair up with a teacher in the Thursday-Friday Model and a learning assistant will be assigned to work with each pair. Each pair of teachers will also share their classrooms. Each classroom will have the full class set of desks set up in rows with 6 feet of distance. Two In -Person Days: All safety protocols from the In-Person Plan will be used. Three Remote Learning Days: All students will follow their individual schedule. Students will be expected to start their day in their class meeting and attendance will be taken. Students will have a variety of full class meeting time, small group meeting time, independent work time and scheduled breaks as per their schedule. Students are expected to end their day in a class meeting. Special education services and interventions can be scheduled during

Administration Responsibilities:

- Town-hall events to prep students/families for September
- Enhanced Weekend Update
- Streamline communication for updating parents
- Create professional development opportunities for teachers to plan effectively
- Further develop two-way communication with families for increased engagement

 - Brad Austin Thank you to everyone involved! As a teacher teaching in front of a computer screen with 8-10 students behind their screen is going to be tough.
 - Mike Fontanella If there is an opportunity to accommodate more students with in-person learning in this hybrid plan, we might be able to adjust the plans as we move forward.

INTERESTED CITIZENS

- Heather Stimpson If I opt in to the hybrid plan at RSS will my child only be taught by a licensed teacher one day a week? Cheryl Temple Students will be taught by their teachers all five days. Some days in the same room and other days would be remotely.
- Rebecca Lewis Our children will be doing remote learning. It sounds like the remote learning plan is only half as good as the in-person plan. Mike Fontanella any loss of in-person learning is negative. It is a fluent situation now and we might have to switch our learning plans throughout the year.
- Justin McCarthy we will have a remote learning plan in place.
- Brad Austin remote learning will be giving every student a robust education.
- Matthew Hunt This past spring was not a great example. He believes it could be a whole lot better this fall.
- Kelly Clenchy We are not going into this fall blind. He is confident that our remote learning will be robust.
 - Erin Ridge Is there a recording of this meeting. Where can we find the presentations? Mike Fontanella, the school committee meeting minutes are posted on the district website. The packet is also posted online.
 - Andrea Michaud Any special educator going into classrooms. Will they be servicing many students in different classrooms? What will you be doing with students who cannot tolerate to wearing a mask for a longer period of time?

DESE Guidance for Number of Cases Per Capita Per 14 Day Rolling Average






Public Health Metrics For Covid-19

Positivity Threshold: Accepted threshold of percent of positive tests

Both the Center for Disease Control (CDC) and World Health Organization set a 5% positivity threshold as a safe standard for reopening schools.


New York City is setting a threshold of 3%. Harvard's Global Health Institute recommended opening schools only when the daily infection rate is less than 3%.
